A Message from our Executive Director:

In 1992, my parents, Pastors Jim and Peggy Minor, founded Harvest House with just 6 beds for men in recovery from substance abuse. Today, Harvest House has 9 supportive housing campuses and 25 affordable rentals encompassing 400+ beds serving nearly 1,000 individuals annually. Harvest House believes that all people deserve safe, stable housing, and the opportunity to renew their hope again.

As a pioneer in the transitional and permanent supportive housing movement, Harvest House is one of the few nonprofit organizations in Sarasota to work towards the development, preservation, and management of affordable, service-enriched housing. We serve homeless families, veterans, youth ages 16 to 24, and adults with a history of incarceration and substance abuse.

Our model is becoming the standard for serving members of our community who are working to rebuild their lives. We believe that affordable and supportive housing programs improve economic status, revitalize neighborhoods, and stabilize lives. Our experience has taught us that housing is just the starting point. The human services sector must offer opportunity for the whole person: the body, mind and spirit. This holistic approach is the core to how Harvest House serves our community.

We have created places of love and belonging; places where birthdays and high school graduations are celebrated, baby showers are thrown, where fun nights and enrichment activities are the norm. Residents enjoy swimming lessons, dance classes, nature & art exploration, and sporting events. Our supportive community instills the courage to look beyond today's circumstances, the confidence to grab the keys to the future, and the ability to explore the wondrous possibilities that await.

Within this booklet, you will learn how our supportive services coupled with safe, stable housing are transforming the lives of men, women, and children within our region. I invite you to join us by taking a tour or becoming a supporter as we champion hope & transform lives!

Family Services

Emergency Shelter (Family Haven)

The shelter provides safe accommodations at no cost for families who have no safe place to sleep. Families can stay up to 30 days in an apartment style unit. Case managers work with the family upon arrival to ensure the children are enrolled in and attending school or child care, the parent(s) are working, and the family has access to the benefits and services they qualify for. After basic needs are met, the next steps are taken to find sustainable housing .

Transitional Housing (Family Haven)

For families that may need more time to find and secure sustainable permanent solutions. Housing is offered at no cost for up to 90 days with intensive case management services.

Permanent Supportive Housing (Home Again)

For families with multiple barriers to sustainable housing and have experienced homelessness on many occasions. Families are offered intensive case management and a myriad of life-skills and enrichment classes.

Youth Services

Outreach

An Outreach Youth Advocate seeks out unaccompanied youth congregating in places not meant for habitation throughout Sarasota County to build rapport and engage them in stabilization services.

Case Management

Support services connecting homeless youth with safe housing, employment, and other crucial services.

Supportive Housing

Emergency shelter and transitional housing for young women who are in immediate need of a safe haven, and a long-term transitional living program (up to 18 mo.) that provides the opportunity for young men and women to work on long term goals, including college or trade-school.

Drop-In Center (YOUth Center)

A safe place for youth to recharge during the day and access services and support groups designed just for them.

Addiction Services

Freedom for Men

75 beds are available for men in recovery in Sarasota and Manatee Counties.

Freedom for Women

The unique needs of women in recovery are met by the intimate structure of the 22 bed recovery facility in North Sarasota.

Residential Recovery Model

This Residential Recovery Model is set in a therapeutic environment that is peer-driven and supported by professional staff and case managers. The model is a hybrid between a half-way house and an inpatient treatment program.

Recovery Services

Including counseling, addiction education, career placement, anger management, and more.

Life-Enrichment Courses

Including financial literacy, yoga and meditation, art therapy, emotional intelligence and more.

Veteran Services

Transitional Housing

In partnership with the Department of Veterans Affairs, the VETS program provides 24 beds in a dorm-style that are set in a therapeutic environment designed to foster comradery and the creation of lasting support systems. This program is provided at no cost to the veteran.

Recovery Services & Life-Enrichment Courses

Including counseling, career placement, anger management, addiction education, financial literacy, yoga and meditation, art therapy, and more.

Supportive Services

Case managers work with veterans to create a housing plan, set, track and achieve goals, and access services to increase their well-being.

Homebound Services

Our goal is to assist homeless Veterans in achieving residential stability, increase their skill levels and/or income, and obtain greater self-determination so they may lead productive, healthy lives and never return to homelessness.

Family Haven

Emergency Shelter & Transitional Housing Services for Families

The Family Haven is the designated emergency shelter for families in North Sarasota County. Emergency shelter is the safety net that keeps families off the streets, which is a vital tool in ending homelessness. However, we believe that housing alone isn't enough, so we provide the critical support and case management services needed for long-term sustainability. We connect families to child care, medical care, counseling, job training, SNAP benefits, and other services that will help them find transitional or permanent housing outside the shelter.

Upon falling on hard times, many families may be reluctant to reach out for stabilization services. They may feel embarrassment, defeat, and denial, or they

may simply not know what to ask for or where to ask. Through our many partnerships we hope to increase awareness of our network of local services and diminish the fear that families might feel.

This is why our facilities look and feel like home. Each of our 3-bedroom furnished apartments are equipped with a living room, kitchen, and bathroom, in addition to bedroom doors that can be locked so families know their space is safe and secure. The units are fully stocked with appliances, toiletries, cleaning supplies, and fresh food. We want families to rest their heads in beds that are good enough to be our own, and children to feel safe and happy during this transitional time.

Homelessness can happen to any one of us. Our goal is to help families that are facing these circumstances by moving them into stable housing as soon as possible.

Families receive free counseling and robust case management services that continue up to 18 months after they have relocated from our campus.

There is no cost for families during their stay in the Family Haven. Participants are expected to:

- (1) engage in a Stabilization Plan,
- (2) refrain from active substance abuse,
- (3) abide by residential community rules, and
- (4) maintain regular engagement with a case manager.

EMERGENCY SHELTER

- 6 dorms, 24 beds
- Max of 30 days
- No cost

Families in Sarasota County who have no safe place to sleep can contact **(941) 203-6454** to be referred to a safe shelter.

TRANSITIONAL HOUSING

- 5 units, 24 beds
- Max of 90 days
- No cost

This program is designed to allow families more time to get back on their feet. Participants are placed via agency referrals.



Home Again

Permanent Supportive Housing Services for Families

Finding a safe, clean, affordable place to live can be nearly impossible for families in a community with high housing costs, so in 2013, *Home Again* was born. *Home Again* now stretches across three campuses and serves 108 individuals on any given night. Affordable, permanent housing, coupled with other crucial social services, is the ultimate solution to homelessness.

Our goal is to house families falling through the cracks. Our partnership with HUD helps us serve families with the highest acuity of need, while the Lee Wetherington Family Village makes it possible to serve vulnerable families who don't meet specific government definitions, but are still in need of a safety net. We look for the most vulnerable applicants: those who a landlord will not consider because of an eviction history, a

poor credit score, a criminal background, a lack of substantial income, and other barriers to sustainability. We host a variety of interactive programs from our seasonal GrowBox Garden projects (see p. 27) to outdoor picnics, casual get-togethers, special topic workshops, field trips, and weekly life-skills classes.

We believe that encouraging someone to engage in their future is the best way to give them a future. Participants are expected to:

- (1) refrain from drug and alcohol use,
- (2) engage full time in education and/or employment, &
- (3) track and set goals with their case manager.

Youth Services

Homeless young adults ages 16 - 24, come from a history of insufficient support systems, various types of abuse, episodes in and out of the foster care system, parents with addiction, and homelessness as children. As children age out these situations, they are often expected to become a productive member of society on their own. However, the extreme privilege gaps that these youth face make them vulnerable to a cycle of poverty and homelessness for generations to come.

It is estimated that there are more than 400 unaccompanied youth in Sarasota County alone. We know this population is underrepresented and largely unidentified, however, we believe that if we can engage them now, we can prevent them from experiencing the ongoing traumas of homelessness.

Outreach

Our Outreach Youth Advocate is tasked with identifying and engaging with at-risk and unaccompanied youth in Sarasota County. Once initial contact is made, the Outreach Youth Advocate works to build rapport in order to link youth to a safety net of services including safe shelter, counseling, healthcare, transportation, identification recovery, school preparedness, and employment.


We host a variety of safe, free, fun social events for homeless and at-risk youth such as movie nights, game nights, and picnics as a way to engage youth that may not feel comfortable seeking out services. We also host *Youth Talks*, a weekly safe place for young people to talk and be heard, covering a variety of topics.

Case Management

These services are for youth ages 16-24 experiencing or at-risk of homelessness that are ready to make a plan for housing, employment, education, and other related goals.

Youth Action Board (YAB)

Formed by a partnership between Harvest House, Suncoast Partnership, Schoolhouse Link, More Too Life, and Gulf Coast Community Foundation, the Youth Action Board is comprised of young leaders ages 16-24 who have personal experience with homelessness or have been a part of the foster care system. The board is a voice in the creation and implementation of the comprehensive and coordinated plan for unaccompanied youth in our community.



Youth Center

The Youth Center is North Sarasota's first and only drop-in center offering a safe place for homeless and at-risk youth ages 16 to 24. Youth can take a shower, do laundry, charge electronics, have a snack, escape bad weather, relax and hang out, meet other youth, receive counseling, and attend support groups, workshops, and classes covering a variety of topics including:

- Narcotics Anonymous for youth
- LGBTQ+ experience and needs
- Dating Safety
- Sexual Health and Wellness including HIV/STD testing
- Pregnancy
- Continuing Education opportunities

New Heights


Long-term Transitional Living Program for Unaccompanied Youth (18-24)

Opened in March 2017, **New Heights is the most comprehensive program serving unaccompanied homeless youth with supportive housing.** Participants are expected to: **(1)** Engage, full time. This involves working, going to school, volunteering, or a combination of the three. **(2)** Attend monthly-organized outings. These outings are hosted by a variety of volunteers that are focused on developing social skills, cultivating responsibility and punctuality, and exposing participants to various careers, cultural experiences, and fun! **(3)** Refrain from active substance abuse.

One of the biggest barriers for unaccompanied youth is lack of financial resources, therefore, services for New Heights participants are completely free, including living space, utilities, and access to the Harvest Food Pantry. One of the first activities the Case Manager will do with clients is to help them to create and maintain a

monthly budget. Instead of paying rent, participants are expected to pay into an escrow account on the first of each month to simulate the practice of rent paying. The amount is determined by their budget; for some, it is \$50 and others, up to \$500. Upon exiting the program, clients leave with enough money saved to pay for move-in expenses or other immediate needs and with the budgeting skills to maintain stability.

Once a month, New Heights participants are taken on outings in the community with a Harvest House staff member and a volunteer chaperone. These outings promote camaraderie, appreciation for the arts and culture, and offer exposure to experiences that are often limited to youth with certain privileges. For example, we've seen a show at Westcoast Black Theatre Troupe, taken salsa lessons at Fred Astaire, did a scavenger hunt at Selby Botanical Gardens, gone kayaking at Mote Marine, and so much more. 

Freedom

Residential Recovery for Men and Women

The national need for communities to engage solutions around the opioid crisis has never been higher, and Sarasota-Manatee is ground zero.

Harvest House is at the forefront of this issue. We've taken an organizational and personal interest in serving our community in response to this crisis by offering sustainable health, hope, and recovery opportunities for this population in need. *Freedom* is a key partner to local judicial systems. On average, over 50% of Freedom clients come directly from jail, providing released inmates with a supportive community and tools to reestablish their footing in society.

Freedom is a highly progressive, structured program that focuses primarily on skill mastery. Our hope is that our clients master the skills to thrive in their personal health and wholeness and be contributors to their families and communities.

Barriers to effective recovery typically include cost, lack of insurance, social stigma, convenience, and the lack of a comprehensive treatment. **We've created an innovative model to address all of these barriers.** For a truly holistic approach to health and wholeness, we recognize that transformation over reformation leads to successful, lasting recovery solutions. We focus on addressing the entire existence of the whole person: body, mind, and spirit.

Our standard program plan covers nine months of residential recovery and one month of aftercare. Recovery plans are uniquely structured per the needs of the individual, but all require full time employment and classes six nights each week. We currently have 97 beds in Sarasota and Manatee Counties.

VETS

Veterans Empowered through Transitional Services

VETS was created in 2011 to address the unique needs of our Vets. The program assists male veterans who have struggled with emotional trauma and/or substance abuse by offering housing set in a therapeutic community, recovery and life-skill classes, case management, and homebound services.

Higher rates of physical and emotional trauma, substance abuse, and unemployment make veterans twice as likely to become homeless than non-veterans. Although these individuals are revered for their service, there is a monumental lack of programs and social networks to help returning soldiers adjust to civilian life.

Eligible participants will have served at least 1 day of active duty, exited service with Honorable, Other than Honorable, or General discharge, and have not used 3 GPD stays.

We believe that all people, including veterans, have the right to a safe and stable place to live.


Since 2010, Harvest House has served over 230 veterans with transitional housing and support services.

The Numbers

- On a single night in January 2018, **37,878** veterans were experiencing homelessness in the U.S., accounting for just under **9%** of all homeless adults.
- Approximately **18 out of every 10,000 veterans** in the United States experienced homelessness on a single night in 2018.
- **Men accounted for nine in ten veterans** experiencing homelessness (91% or 34,412 veterans).
- **African Americans comprised one-third** of veterans experiencing homelessness.
- According to the National Coalition for Homeless Veterans, there are about **1.4 million other veterans that are at risk of homelessness** because of poverty, lack of support systems, and poor living conditions.
- According to the US Department of Veteran's Affairs, **1 in 10 soldiers** seen in the VA that are returning from the wars in Iraq and Afghanistan **have a problem with alcohol or other drugs.**

Graduate Housing

Affordable Supportive Housing for Freedom Graduates

We find that occasionally *Freedom* graduates (see page 20) benefit from continued supportive housing during their next steps in recovery. In our Graduate Housing program, tenants sign a lease at an affordable rate that includes their rent and utilities, and they maintain access to the supportive services of the Freedom program, including the life-skills classes, support groups, and our loving community. For some, this is necessary step after recovery from addiction and finding sustainable housing. Others will never be able to live on their own due to age and/or pre-existing conditions.

NSP Affordable Rentals

Neighborhood Stabilization Program

Through the Neighborhood Stabilization Program (NSP) HUD provided money to local governments, nonprofits, and all 50 states for the purpose of stabilizing communities that have suffered from foreclosures and abandonment. NSP partners acquired and rehabilitated properties to sell or rent to low- and moderate-income households. Harvest House is honored to participate in this nationwide program with 25 affordable rental units throughout Sarasota and Manatee Counties. Many of these units are inhabited by former clients who worked hard to end the cycle of homelessness in their family. NSP contributes to our overall mission of **revitalizing neighborhoods and transforming lives.**

Success Story: Laura & Bobby

Laura and Bobby came from two different worlds. Bobby started drinking and using at a young age as a means to escape the pain of sexual, physical, and emotional abuse, but hid much of his use because it was not permitted in his gang. Laura was a functioning alcohol and cocaine addict for ten years but is still trying to figure out why she started. "I had a good, happy life," she said.

After Laura completed the *Freedom* program she moved into Graduate Housing, allowing her to stay closely connected to her recovery. She met Bobby working with the Street Ministry for the Harvest Church and they knew right away they were perfect for each other. In Oct. 2017, Laura and Bobby moved into an NSP affordable rental from Harvest House. They very quickly got custody of Bobby's four children between the ages of 6 and 12, who are also survivors of abuse.

Laura and Bobby, now engaged, find purpose in their children, even though Laura is not their biological mother. "The kids came with no clothes or belongings, so we worked hard to be able to give them everything they needed, but we couldn't have done that without affordable housing.

We both have two jobs, but it's worth it. When we started looking to move out of Harvest House, we couldn't get anyone to rent to us because of Bobby's criminal history. Once, a prospective landlord told us in front of our kids, 'I would be embarrassed to house you with his background.' It was so heartbreaking." Finally, in Oct. 2018, Bobby and Laura found their perfect 4-bedroom home. The landlord simply wanted responsible, paying tenants. "We knew in our hearts that we would be the best tenants he would ever have. We're fixing it up to leave it better than we got it."

Both Bobby and Laura pinpoint **forgiveness** as the key to freedom in their recovery journey. It wasn't just about healing the addiction, it was about getting to the root of their problem. Laura says "the coolest thing about being completely sober is that I have nothing to hide. I was so secretive before, because I was ashamed." For Bobby, "there's a lot of shame tied to abuse, especially for men. I didn't talk about it until I was 25 years old but sharing my story has allowed others to open up and start the healing process too. It all starts with forgiveness."



Harvest Food Pantry

Providing Food Security to Sarasota Since 1990

Because of the service and seasonal economic environment here in Sarasota County, 33% of residents are one crisis away from poverty, and often make desperate choices to make ends meet.*

We never want anyone to have to choose between a rent or mortgage payment and feeding their family. Pastors Jim and Peggy Minor moved to Sarasota in 1984 and discovered many struggling men, women, and children. They began their outreach in the community with the **Harvest Food Pantry**.

"I remember sitting down and recognizing that so many people were coming for food because they had an issue with drugs and alcohol," Pastor Jim recalls. "We needed to create a safe place for them and that's how Harvest House was born."

Every week, the Harvest Food Pantry distributes an average of 50lbs of fresh fruit, vegetables, meat, and dry goods to each family. In 2018, over 450,000 lbs of food were distributed to 9,000 Sarasota families.


The Harvest Food Pantry is also a resource for other local nonprofits and special outreaches, such as group homes for foster children and the elderly. In collaboration with these nonprofits, an additional 87,500 lbs of food was distributed to our community in 2018, including our very own Harvest House clients.

We have many partners whom we receive donations from or purchase food at a discounted rate, including Trader Joe's, All Faith's Food Bank, Fresh Market, and Publix. This is all possible thanks to our partners and dedicated volunteers.





